USDA Designates Martin County, Minnesota, as a Primary Natural Disaster Area

Emergency Designation | March 26, 2019

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Emergency Support to Producers in Surrounding Counties/Border State Also Available

WASHINGTON, March 26, 2019 — Agriculture Secretary Sonny Perdue designated Martin County, Minnesota, as a primary natural disaster area. Producers who suffered losses due to excessive rain and flooding that occurred April 15 through Aug. 17, 2018, may be eligible for U.S. Department of Agriculture (USDA) Farm Service Agency (FSA) emergency loans.

This natural disaster area designation allows FSA to extend much-needed emergency credit to producers recovering from natural disasters. Emergency loans can be used to meet various recovery needs including the replacement of essential items such as equipment or livestock, reorganization of a farming operation or the refinance of certain debts.

Producers in the contiguous Minnesota counties of Blue Earth, Faribault, Jackson, and Watonwan, along with Emmet and Kossuth counties in Iowa, are also eligible to apply for emergency loans.

The deadline to apply for these emergency loans is Nov. 20, 2019.

FSA will review the loans based on the extent of losses, security available and repayment ability.

FSA has a variety of additional programs to help farmers recover from the impacts of this disaster.

FSA programs that do not require a disaster declaration include: Emergency Assistance for Livestock,

Honeybees and Farm-Raised Fish Program; Emergency Conservation Program; Livestock Forage
Disaster Program; Livestock Indemnity Program; Operating and Farm Ownership Loans; and the Tree

Assistance Program.
